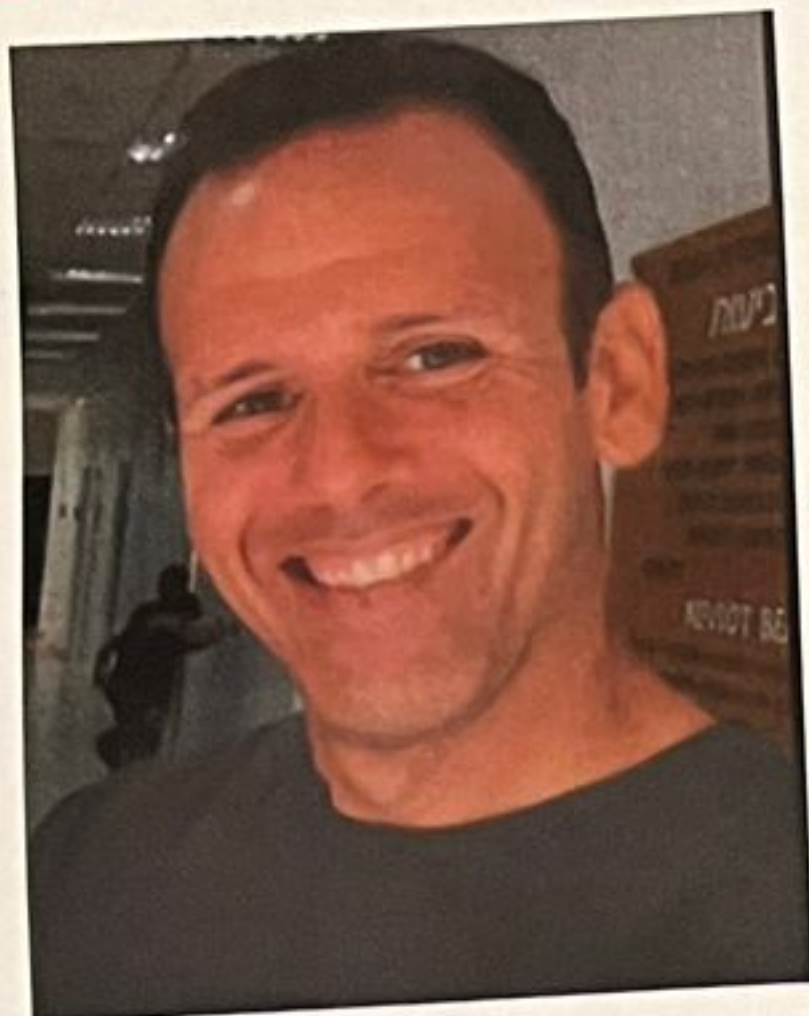




THOSE WE ARE MISSING



Ohad Yahalomi, 50

Ohad, a father of 3, was taken hostage from Kibbutz Nir Oz, after a gun fight with Hamas terrorists in his home on 10/7. The terrorists also tried to abduct his wife, Batsheva, and three young children. Batsheva and two young daughters managed to escape while en route to Gaza; she ran through the fields for three hours with her 10-year-old and one-year-old baby, wearing nothing but flimsy clothing. She managed to escape to the Gaza Strip, where she was taken to a Hamas detention facility. She was released on November 12, was taken to the Gaza Strip, and is still in custody. Her mother, Yarden, is still missing.

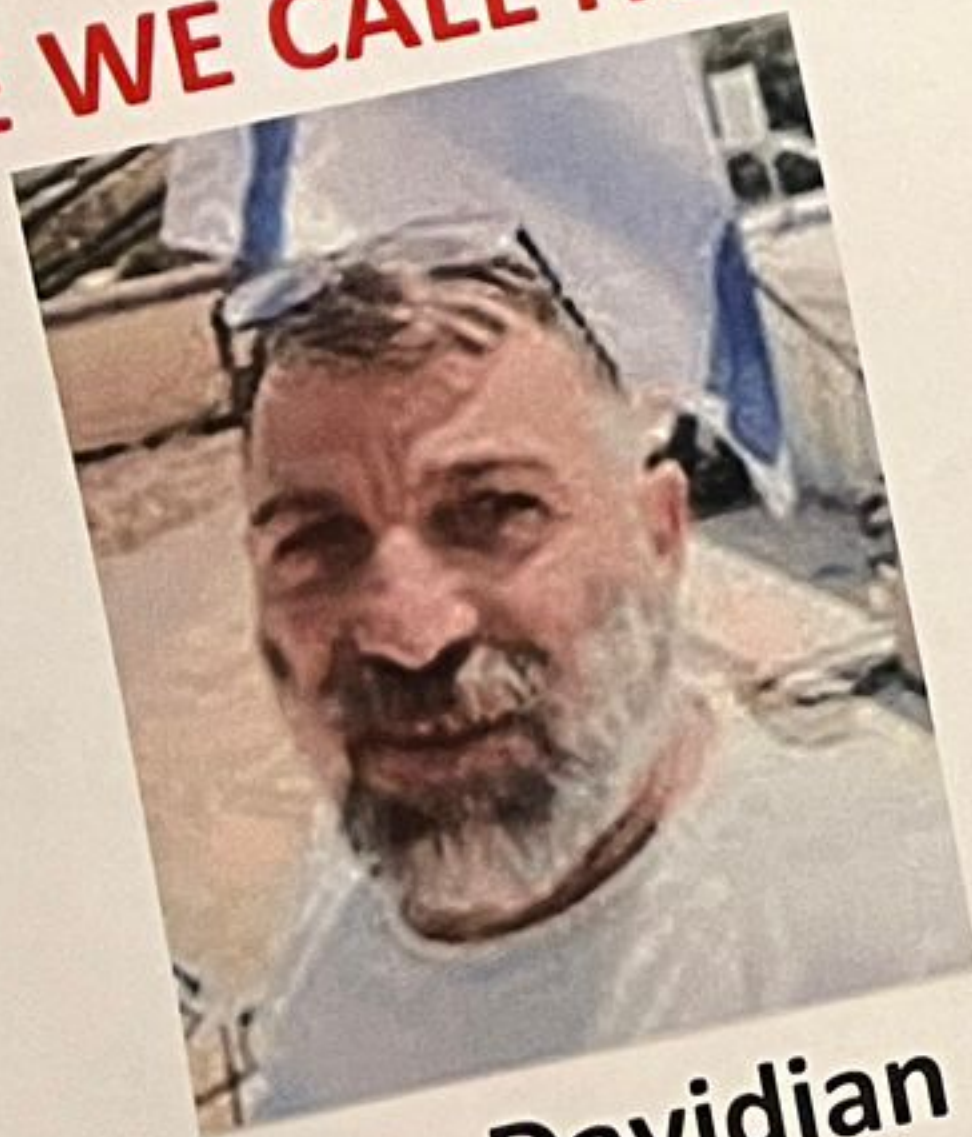
THOSE WE ARE MISSING



Carmel Gat, 39

Carmel Gat is an occupational therapist from Tel Aviv who was visiting her family in Kibbutz Be'eri on 10/7. During the attack, the terrorists entered the family home where Carmel was staying along with her parents, her brother Alon and sister-in-law Yarden, and their 3-year-old daughter, Geffen. Carmel's mother was shot and killed in front of her family. The father managed to escape. Carmel and Geffen were managed to escape to the Gaza Strip. Yarden was released on November 12. Other hostages are still in custody. Hostage Squad is working to locate Carmel.

THOSE WE CALL HEROES



Oz Davidian

Oz is a local farmer who lived near Kibbutz Reim. On the morning of October 7, he made 20 separate trips to the Festival site to rescue young people who were trapped. Each leg of the 10-mile one-way journey, he took different routes to avoid being shot. Oz is credited with saving many people. His car was shot at and pursued by terrorists. He did not stop him from returning to the site to rescue as many people as he could. While his daughters locked themselves in their car, he went back and forth through the night, until 7am, to provide further proof of life. Oz doesn't consider himself a hero. He says: "When you see hundreds of young people fleeing into the fields and terrorists shooting at them from one side, the fear is overwhelming."

THOSE WE CALL HEROES



Amit Mann, 22

Amit Mann, a Magen David Adom paramedic, was in the medical clinic on Kibbutz Be'eri on October 7, treating victims from the attack. She was trapped in the clinic with the wounded and the dead for six hours, continuously texting with her sisters and pleading for help. Despite hearing the attackers getting closer and realizing that she would no longer be safe in the clinic, Amit bravely stayed at her post, treating the wounded and comforting them in their final moments. She sacrificed herself to protect her patients and fought for their lives until the end. When the terrorists entered the clinic, she hid in the kitchen with a knife. In her final text to her sisters, Amit wrote: "They're here. They're in the clinic. I don't think I'll make it out of here. Please, if something happens to me."
